FOREWARD FROM OUR HEAD OF RESEARCH

Despite the challenges this year brought, I am pleased that we have witnessed the continued growth of our catalogue of research and resources. Over 2021, our team, spanning 13 time zones and five continents, produced 29 articles across our five themes. These tackled contentious modern issues including immigration, trafficking, and gender recognition; analysed contemporary and increasingly important environmental policies, such as circularity, carbon border adjustment mechanisms, and critical raw materials; and examined relationships and politics beyond the EU's borders, looking West, to the US and Latin America; South, to the North and Horn of Africa, and the Sahel; and East, to Russia, Moldova, and the ASEAN nations.

In amongst this library of work were also contained key questions for the nature of life in this new year. Will we see an increase in digital nomadic practices, or a return to the routine of the commute and office life? How much will Covid feature in the political and social consciousness, and how dominant will the topic remain? When, where, and how will improving Al feature in our daily lives? And finally, from IDRN's perspective, which of our research themes will continue to capture our audience's imagination and interest, and how will we adapt to evolving demands in both style and quantity of analysis and insight.














































MEET THE TEAM


ABDELKARIM SKOURI

Federico Dante De Falco

- The regulatory sentiment around Big Tech in the EU has changed in recent years, paving the way for a Digital Markets Act (DMA), proposed by the Commission on 15 December 2020.
- The current proposal on the DMA presents a discrepancy between the scope of action and its objective. By targeting large digital gatekeeper platforms, the regulation relies on an unclear competition framework and on a legal basis that could jeopardise the authority's action.
- Regulatory actions in the digital markets should find a compromise between effective Big Tech regulation and preservation of competition dynamics in the Single Market, with the European Parliament and Member States playing a crucial role in this.

PERRITAR PRARRET

ON COOPERATION AND COMPETITION: IMPLICATIONS FOR SOCIAL PROGRESS AND INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS 5 FFBRUARY 2021

- Cooperative vs. competitive tendencies are always present within all societies, but there has historically been much debate about which of the two is the "default" in human nature and is more beneficial to social progress.
- Our own view on the issue matters: we build institutions that preserve and foster those characteristics we believe to be advantageous, and we set up cultural frameworks that promote them.
- When shifting the debate towards group behaviour, more layers need to be included into the discussion. Of particular importance is group identity, and how it evolves and shapes our understanding of the system around us. At the international level, collaborating with group members appears to be a winning competitive strategy, while reasoning in terms of group identity might hold precious insights on how to promote international cooperation.

Sarah Hunter

- Many European Nations such as the UK and Poland are not doing enough to protect the rights of their gender diverse citizens.
- Currently, both Poland and the UK fail to recognise non-binary individuals, and force transgender people into a lengthy medical and legal process to be recognised as transgender on official documents.
- Contrasting this, Spain is currently working on passing a new Gender Recognition Act, that would allow the process of retaining a Gender Recognition Certificate to be much simpler, and would also legally recognise non-binary individuals.
- Furthermore, a shared approach to gender recognition could lead to wider acceptance of transgender individuals and would force countries that are falling behind, to improve the lives of their gender diverse citizens.



- Minorities, and particularly immigrant populations, have less access to healthcare than the general population in Europe.
- Both healthcare policies and the collective perceptions and definitions of who is and who is not a citizen, have consequences for the access to healthcare of minority groups.
- While altering the public perception is important, more immediate and largescale results can be achieved by making healthcare policies in Europe more inclusive towards immigrant populations.

- The EU member states must change the lens through which they used to see North Africa before the Arab Spring.
- The region provides as many challenges as opportunities to the EU, mainly regarding migration, energy and security.
- The region is also witnessing quests for influence by international actors, making collaboration between the EU and the US necessary.
- The absence of an effective North African regional organisation, mainly because of the Western Sahara deadlock, makes building a partnership a complicated task.



- The diplomatic relationship between the United States and the European Union dates back to 1953 and is one of the most important bilateral relationships in the world.
- With the election of Joe Biden, there is now space for reflection and cooperation. A new transatlantic strategy must be developed, based on shared commonalities between the two leading world powers.
- Policymakers in the US and EU should look to the future and re-build the relationship by collaborating on common challenges, while at the same time recognising and overcoming the fundamental differences in their national values.
- The two powers must acknowledge their interdependence and demonstrate support for strong multilateral institutions and treaties, while maintaining a respectful dialogue and leaving the past behind.



Introduction: Latin America and the EU: The importance of transatlantic relations






- The European Commission will present a mammoth policy package containing 12 policy proposals needed to reach the emissions reduction targets enshrined in the recently approved Climate Law. The proposal of a carbon border adjustment mechanism, or CBAM, has been given attention for its ambition and complexity.
- Currently, the risk of carbon leakage within the EU ETS is addressed through several measures, most notably free allocation.
 However, this measure has proven to be inefficient throughout the years, as several heavy-emitting industries have consistently been overallocated with CO2 permits.
- The CBAM proposal offers an alternative to the current carbon leakage framework. The proposal aims at making sure the price of products exported to the EU takes into account their carbon content, thus leveraging the competition field with European producers.

- Historically, the Horn of Africa has been an extremely volatile region, plagued by terrorist groups, genocide, and coups.
- Evaluating the success of the EU's projects in the region leads to the conclusion that while the European Union contributes broad efforts to provide aid in the Horn of Africa in a vast number of sectors such as education, employment and infrastructure, making progress in this region of instability and conflict is difficult.
- Concrete achievements can be seen such as in the EU's efforts against piracy in Somalia, although critics of international aid raise important questions as to the sustainability of the EU's efforts.
- Evidently, it seems too early in the process of rebuilding the region to meaningfully evaluate what long-term impact the European Union's efforts will have on the Horn of Africa.
